



PASTORAL STRUCTURE

Our Pastoral Structure has been designed to ensure that pupils will always have access to individual attention or support when needed: on a day-to-day basis in their Tutor Groups, and from either the Head of Lower or Upper School when needed.

Single year tutor groups divided into four houses: Dart, Mole, Tae and Yeo.

Years 10 & 11

Guild System: subject-based tutor groups where pupils receive specialist subject intervention based on their needs.



Rewarding Effort



Effort is valued highly at the College, and we reward pupils who work hard, regardless of their attainment grades.

Every half term we celebrate pupils' effort across all their subjects. Each pupil is given an 'effort' grade, and the top ten pupils in each year group with the most grade ones are awarded a certificate and badge. This begins with a Half Bronze, followed by Bronze, Half Silver, Silver, Half Gold and finally - if a pupil is in the top ten for effort in each half term - the Gold award. In recognition of the pupils who may have just missed out, but whose hard work we still wish to celebrate, we present 'Intermediate Scholar Awards' to the next highest scoring five boys and five girls.

These awards are highly prized, and are awarded by the Headteacher during assemblies. We give pride of place to the Scholar Award lists and photographs in displays around the College.


Provisional Results 2025

Year 11 2025 pupils and all my colleagues worked relentlessly in order to achieve another nationally significant set of GCSE results. These results will be some of the best in the country for a mainstream comprehensive school.

Chulmleigh regularly tops the table in the county for many of the GCSE published progress measures.

Although our pupils have been getting breathtaking results for 10 years now, we know that our job is to work with pupils for the results in the future. We can't ever be complacent.

I am particularly proud of what the school has achieved with our Ebacc results. This measurement was designed to benchmark schools against a suite of academic subjects and is designed to stop schools from bypassing giving every pupil the opportunity to study English literature and language, maths, a humanities subject, at least two sciences and a modern foreign language. These subjects give our young people options about what they want to study next. We know that a disproportionate number of our pupils join Exeter College's Reach Academy, Exeter Maths School, take 'A' Level French and join Exeter College Sports Academies. There is talk of scrapping this measure nationally, because it is too difficult to get. We would regret that decision but carry on with our academic emphasis regardless of the latest educational piece of groupthink.

Curriculum

Key Stage 3 (Years 7 - 9)

The first three years of secondary school are about breadth. We believe that a broad education is essential, and our academic provision follows the National Curriculum. Key Stage 3 builds on the knowledge and skills of Key Stage 2, and also lays the foundations for GCSE and further study. Pupils will study the following subjects:

English and English Literature, Mathematics, Sciences, French, Geography, History, Religion, Philosophy and Ethics, Physical Education, Computer Science, Art, Drama, Music, Food and Nutrition and Design and Technology.

Key Stage 4 (Years 10 & 11)

Pupils begin GCSE study formally in Year 10, and are given the opportunity to specialise in subjects that are in addition to their core areas of study. In the Spring Term



of Year 9, pupils may personalise their curriculum by choosing subjects from the optional block, which will determine what their programme of study will be in Years 10 and 11. To support this process the College produces a booklet, and has a number of events that enable parents and pupils to find out more about the courses on offer.

Arrangement of Teaching Groups

The College operates a mixed system, with some linear setting with mixed groups. Decisions on the arrangements of classes in Year 7 are made using information from our feeder primary schools, SATS results and baseline testing in school.

We determine the structure of Year 7 classes prior to pupils starting in September, but some movement is natural and is encouraged. Typically the College operates with a number of mixed ability sets and faster moving accelerated classes, but this always depends on the cohort and what is best for them.



School Transport Service

Chulmleigh College offers a subsidised transport service to families who wish to attend our school, but who are outside the Devon County Council transport area for the College, and so do not qualify for free school transport.

The availability of this service relies on parental contributions.

Creative Technology

Computing

KS3

At KS3 pupils have one lesson a week throughout the year where they begin in Year 7 by learning about the health and safety of the computer room and how to use the school network and stay safe online. Pupils then move onto learning to confidently model data with a spreadsheet, from using basic formulas and pupils develop their IT and digital literacy skills. In Year 8 pupils are introduced to Python, learning text-based programming. They develop their knowledge in Programs, Operating Systems & Components, including an introduction to artificial intelligence. In Year 9 pupils further develop their knowledge of Python and learn about Physical computing and the host of components built into the micro bits. They write simple programs that use these components to interact with the physical world. This gives them a good insight into what GCSE Computing entails, should they decide to take this course as a GCSE option.

GCSE Computing

GCSE Computing isn't just about using tech — it's about creating it! You'll become a problem-solver, a thinker, and a creator. Whether your dream is to design video games, work in cybersecurity, or just understand the tech around you, this subject gives you the tools to do it.

Pupils will learn:

- How computers tick Discover the internal workings of laptops, tablets, or phones, and how they make everything work.
- Programming with Python Code writing to build programs, solve problems, and even make simple games. Python is used all over the world and is an invaluable language to learn for any IT enthusiasts.
- Data & logic Pupils learn how computers use numbers, text, images, and logic to make decisions and solve problems.
- Cybersecurity Pupils discover how to stay safe online and how companies protect their data from hackers.

Other ways you can engage in Computing at Chulmleigh:

Robotics Club (Lego STEM Competitions).

Hands-on robotics projects using Lego STEM kits, culminating in local and possibly national competitions. This encourages teamwork, problemsolving, and practical application of computational thinking. It also helps to engage and enthuse those pupils who are interested in taking the GCSE in computing.

Computing Club (Python Programming):

Early access to Python resources and activities once a week for Year 8 and 9 pupils (possibly Year 7 too). This will provide an early opportunity to engage with the KS3 curriculum, which can then be extended in class as competence develops.







Creative Technology

Design & Technology

At Chulmleigh College we aim to inspire our pupils to be innovative and passionate when designing and making, to critique the merits of technology and to develop skills for life. Design and Technology builds on the skills and knowledge pupils have already learnt at primary school. We encourage them to develop their skills; to find solutions to problems people have in real world situations, with sustainability being key to pupils' development of ideas. Blending creativity with practical application, D&T nurtures future engineers, designers, architects, and innovators.

Our curriculum provides pupils with opportunities to engage in hands on learning in well-resourced workshops. They have access to high level exemplar design and making which inspires and shows them what they are truly capable of. Pupils develop underlying knowledge of the theory that underpins the practice taking place and work alongside peers and staff who actively challenge and support them to achieve their potential. Pupils develop the knowledge, understanding and skills that will enable them to pursue their dreams and ambitions.

The impact of our curriculum is evident in our pupils' enthusiasm for the subject which is displayed around the department and in lessons, our pupils' work and their progress is evident in their written and practical work. Chulmleigh pupils become aware that design and technology is integral to life in our modern world, where they can try new ideas, apply their skills in imaginative ways whilst being critical of its possible impact on the world, both positive and negative.

Throughout lower school pupils have DT lessons one hour per week throughout the year, this provides the opportunity for them to learn theory around the subject and engage in practical experiences using a wide variety of materials and skills. The projects cover practical skills that link to theoretical topics within the GCSE specification, helping provide an important general understanding for all, but also a base that can be built on for any pupils wishing to take the subject further as a GCSE option.









Creative Technology

Food Preparation and Nutrition

At Chulmleigh College, we blend practical cooking with deep nutritional knowledge, giving pupils the tools to become confident cooks, critical thinkers, and informed consumers. Studying Food Preparation and Nutrition empowers pupils with essential life skills, promotes healthy living, and unlocks pathways to exciting careers in health, hospitality, and food science.

KS3

The main aim in Food Preparation and Nutrition at KS3 is to inspire pupils with a passion for the subject alongside equipping them to prepare and create a variety of foods with independence and confidence.

Food provides excellent cross-curricular links with subjects such as Science and PE and can provide many exciting opportunities for further study.

Throughout lower school pupils have Food one hour per week throughout the year, this provides the opportunity for them to gain theoretical and practical experience in a wide variety of food related skills. The projects cover practical skills that link to theoretical topics within the GCSE specification, helping provide an important general understanding for all, but also a base that can be built on for any pupils wishing to take the subject further.

KS4

We currently offer GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition. It is a fresh, exciting and creative course which inspires and motivates. It focuses on practical cooking skills to ensure pupils develop a thorough understanding of nutrition, where our food comes from and the working characteristics of food materials. This qualification places a huge emphasis on nurturing pupils' practical cookery skills alongside providing a strong understanding of nutrition.









English

Welcome to the English Department

At Chulmleigh College, our English Department aims to inspire a lifelong love of literature, language, and communication. We believe that developing strong reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills is not only essential for academic success, but also for equipping pupils with the tools to express themselves, engage with the world, and become thoughtful, informed members of the community.

The Curriculum: What Will You Study?

At Key Stage 3 (Years 7, 8, and 9), pupils will experience a rich and diverse curriculum that builds on foundational skills and introduces them to a variety of texts and writing styles. The curriculum is designed to promote an understanding of the world through literature and language, with a strong focus on reading comprehension, creative writing, and critical thinking.

In Year 7, pupils will embark on a journey through classic literature such as Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol', powerful poetry including seminal works by the Romantics poets, and contemporary fiction, such as Deborah Ellis' novel 'The Breadwinner'. The course is designed to build confidence in reading, writing, and speaking, while encouraging curiosity, empathy, and creativity. Pupils will develop core skills in analysis, interpretation, comparison, and creative composition.

In Year 8, pupils will continue to develop their reading, writing, and spoken language skills through the study of a wide range of texts. The course is designed to challenge pupils' thinking, broaden their understanding of different genres and contexts, and encourage creativity and critical analysis. Key units will focus on Gothic Fiction and World War One Poetry, alongside opportunities for comparative study, creative writing, and exploration of non-fiction texts.





The Year 9 English course is designed to develop pupils' skills in reading, writing, speaking, and critical thinking. Pupils will explore a variety of texts—ranging from classic and contemporary literature to short stories and dystopian fiction—while strengthening their ability to analyse language, structure, and ideas in preparation for their GCSE courses. The course also emphasizes creativity, independent interpretation, and effective communication.



English

GCSE English Language

This course develops essential reading, writing, and communication skills. You will explore a wide range of 19th, 20th, and 21st-century texts, learning to analyse language and structure while developing your own creative and transactional writing. Speaking and listening are also assessed through presentations and discussions.

Assessment:

- Two exam papers (100% final grade)
- · Non-exam spoken language endorsement

Skills gained:

- Critical reading and analysis
- · Clear and effective writing
- Confident spoken communication

This qualification is essential for further study and employment, providing a strong foundation for Alevels, apprenticeships, and career pathways.

GCSE English Literature

This course develops skills in reading, analysing and responding to a wide range of texts. Pupils will study classic and modern novels, plays, and poetry, exploring themes, characters and contexts. They will learn to write clear, critical essays, comparing writers' ideas and techniques. The course encourages independent thinking, creativity and a deeper appreciation of literature. Assessment is by exam at the end of Year 11.









English

Accelerated Reader Program

At Chulmleigh College, we are proud to offer the Accelerated Reader (AR) program, which helps pupils track and improve their reading progress in an engaging and interactive way.

What is Accelerated Reader?

Accelerated Reader is a personalised reading program that encourages pupils to read books at their own pace, complete quizzes to test comprehension, and earn 'minutes' based on how well they understood the material. The program is designed to promote reading for pleasure, increase motivation, and support pupils in becoming confident, independent readers.

How Does it Work?

- 1.Star Test: Pupils complete an online reading test which calculates their reading range. This is shared with pupils. The books they read from the library or their collection at home need to be within this range.
- 2. Reading a book: Each pupil selects a book from our wide range of AR-approved titles, which are tailored to their individual reading level. Our library has an extensive selection of books for all ages and interests.
- 3. Taking the Quiz: After finishing a book, pupils take an online quiz to assess their understanding. The quiz is designed to check comprehension and recall key details from the book.
- 4. Earning minutes: Based on their quiz performance, pupils earn minutes. The harder the book, the more minutes it's worth. These minutes are tracked, and monitored by English teachers. The college expectation is that pupils maintain 20 minutes or above.
- 5. Celebrating Success: We celebrate pupils' progress throughout the year! Achievements, such as reaching certain point milestones or improving quiz scores, are recognized in assemblies, class celebrations, and special awards.













Drama

In addition to Drama as part of the curriculum, our vibrant Drama department holds a daily lunchtime club, which is run as an 'open studio'. Pupils can use the space to create, as well as using the lighting and design resources. The studio provides a well-equipped resource for creativity, and the club is very popular amongst pupils of all ages.

In recent years, Year 10 Drama pupils have taken part in the annual Shakespeare Schools Festival, the world's largest youth drama festival with up to 30,000 participants, 1000 schools and 136 theatres, all as part of one Festival.

The Festival, the Shakespeare Schools Foundation's flagship project, uses the unique power of performance to develop self esteem, articulacy, literacy and teamwork; skills that transform lives.

In 2025, the performance was "A Midsummer Night's Dream", involving 16 pupils. The Expressive Arts Department contributed with props, costume design and live musicians on stage towards a modern 'Festival' take on Shakespeare's well-loved comedy.

The final performance, in front of 300 people at the Exeter Barnfield Theatre, was an experience the pupils will never forget - improving their confidence massively as well as enhancing their performance skills heading towards their GCSEs.

LAMDA

The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art is one of the UK's oldest drama schools. We are delighted to offer LAMDA tuition and accredited exams as an extra curricular option (there is a charge). They are highly prestigious and can count towards the UCAS point system when applying for universities and colleges. The syllabus is designed is designed to develop good reading skills, increasing fluency and understanding and aims to expand vocabulary to improve powers and self-expression. Pupils confidence in speaking and listening improves, as does their recall of information and memory.





Music

Lead School for Music

In 2025 we were delighted to be given the status of a Lead School For Music by the Devon Music Education Hub. Alongside five other secondary schools in Devon, Plymouth and Torbay we were recognised as providing outstanding musical education and opportunities for pupils. Over the next three years we will be working closely with the Hub on varying musical projects as well as having input in shaping Devon's Music Education provision.

Music Extra Curricular

Music Tuition at the College is delivered by a team of seven staff. Together these qualified professional music tutors work with over 120+ pupils every week. Music tuition at Chulmleigh College is for anyone who wants to learn, whether you are a beginner or an experienced musician!

Where possible pupils should provide their own instruments, but we have an extensive stock of school instruments that we are happy to lend to pupils to get them started. Also, if it's portable (not a piano or drum kit!) then VAT-free instrument purchases are possible through the College.













Music

Chulmleigh Music Academy

Chulmleigh Music Academy (CMAC) is run in conjunction with the Devon Music Education Hub and is for pupils of schools in the Chulmleigh area.

At CMAC we have the opportunity to make music in small or large groups and ensembles. CMAC takes place at the College on Wednesdays from 3.45pm until 4.45pm.

Our CMAC ensembles include our Brass Group, Woodwind Group, Strings and mixed instrument group and our CMAC Rock Choir. These ensembles are run by our team of expert visiting music teachers and is co-ordinated and overseen by Mr Miners.

Throughout the CMAC year we provide plenty of performance opportunities, a concert at the end of each term, performances as part of other school events and trips further afield to play in venues such as Exeter Cathedral.

Music Making Opportunities

There is always music making opportunities happening within the College. Activites change on a regular basis hopefully allowing pupils with all sorts of musical tastes and abilities to take part. These can range from Rock and Pop Bands to Steel Pan and Samba Drumming groups.

As part of our status as a Lead School For Music in Devon we are fortunate to be able to host and participate in lots of workshops given by external providers, this has ranged from composition workshops with the group Sonopera, DJ sessions with the Cameron Mills Group and large scale performances with other schools.

The College has been rapidly building its Music Technology provision which pupils enjoy using to create their own music. The music rooms are open most lunchtimes for pupils to come in and independently work on their own projects.


Art

Chulmleigh Art Department is a vibrant and creative place, where pupils are encouraged to explore a wide range of techniques and processes. Pupils at Key Stage 3 experience a variety of exciting art projects that help develop technical skills, explore meaningful ideas and encourage curiosity and resilience. The curriculum is designed to be broad, varied, and inclusive.

When pupils reach Key Stage 4, they have the option of choosing an Art or Textile Design GCSE. Pupils have a record of gaining strong results and many go on to study art or design at A-Level. Chulmleigh has a well-equipped art studio and a dedicated space for textiles, where GCSE pupils are allocated a personal sewing machine and working area.

Pupils can extend their creative abilities through lunchtime clubs, a half-termly Doodle Challenge, participating in the Big Draw Festival and contributing artwork to the Annual Schools Exhibition at Burton Gallery, Bideford. Other recent exhibitions have also included a GCSE show at Studio KIND in Barnstaple.











Humanities

At Chulmleigh College, we believe the Humanities play a vital role in helping pupils understand the world around them—past, present, and future. Our curriculum in Geography, History, and Religious Studies is designed to spark curiosity, promote critical thinking, and build a strong foundation for global citizenship. Pupils' experience of the humanities commences before they arrive, thanks to The Global Cup competition, which is a transition project from Year 6 into Year 7. Pupils research the geography, religion and history of a country of their choice, presenting their projects in many creative ways. The winner is awarded in a celebration assembly.

Geography

The Year 7 Geography curriculum introduces pupils to essential geographical skills and explores the natural world through topics like tropical rainforests, rivers, and oceans, alongside important human themes such as development and population. In Year 8, we delve into global and environmental issues such as climate change, urbanisation and coastal landscapes, with case studies spanning continents—from Asia to Africa. In Year 9, we investigate the forces shaping our world today, from globalisation and superpowers to extreme environments and geopolitical issues in the Middle East.

History

In Year 7, History pupils journey back in time to explore early British history—from Anglo-Saxon and Viking kingdoms through the Norman Conquest and Medieval Life—culminating in key events like The Crusades and the Tudor period. In Year 8, History builds on pupils' historical understanding through in-depth studies of the Civil War, British Empire, Industrial Revolution, and both World Wars, linked with social movements like suffrage and protest. In Year 9, History takes a powerful look at the 20th century and beyond, covering the rise of dictators, the Holocaust, civil rights movements, and social change in post-1950s Britain.









Humanities

Religious Studies

In Year 7, Religious Studies provides a broad introduction to world views and philosophy, including an exploration of Hinduism, Sikhism, and Humanism, helping pupils reflect on diverse beliefs and values. In Year 8, Religious Studies challenges pupils to think deeply about belief systems. They explore Judaism, the teachings of Jesus, and Islam, while also grappling with questions of ethics and morality in today's world. Pupils start their GCSE RS course in Year 9 with a focus on Christianity and Buddhism.


Trips and visits

There is a range of opportunities for pupils to learn outside of the classroom through projects such as a study of the school microclimate and a walk down to the Little Dart in geography. Year 7 pupils get to visit the Eden Project while they are learning about rainforests and to complete a day's walk on Dartmoor in the summer term. We have also taken a small group to the poignant Holocaust Memorial Day in Exeter. At GCSE, geography pupils enjoy trips to Dawlish Warren and Exeter as part of their compulsory fieldwork and history pupils visit Plymouth, visiting key historical landmarks. Pupils might also get the opportunity to visit Iceland and see its amazing tectonic landforms!











Mathematics

Mathematics at our secondary school is an exciting and essential subject that equips pupils with the skills to think critically, solve problems, and understand the world around them. Our engaging and supportive curriculum builds a strong foundation in key areas such as algebra, geometry, statistics, and real-world applications, preparing pupils for further study and a wide range of career paths. With a focus on active learning, mathematical reasoning, and confidence-building, we aim to foster a love of maths in every pupil, helping them to achieve their full potential.

We offer support sessions every lunchtime to enable pupils to seek advice on their homework and classwork. We also have close links with Exeter Maths School and have pupils attending events from each year group every year.

We offer Further Maths and Statistics as options at GCSE and often have several pupils taking their GCSE Maths early in Year 10 then focusing on Statistics and Further Maths in Year 11. We enter pupils yearly for the national UKMT Junior and intermediate Maths challenges with outstanding results. Pupils at Chulmleigh College achieve highly in Mathematcis.











Modern Foreign Languages

French

At Chulmleigh College we know that learning a language is important. Learning a new language opens up a world of opportunities, and French is one of the most exciting languages to learn! Not only will pupils gain the ability to communicate with people from different countries, but they will also discover a new way of thinking.

Learning a language is known to boost your brain, discover new cultures and offers travel and careers opportunities.

The journey of learning a language starts in Year 7 and ends with sitting a GCSE (90% of our pupils take the GCSE exam in Year 11).

Year 7 pupils learn how to describe themselves, their hobbies and their school. We cover the topic of food and ordering food.

Year 8 pupils learn how to describe what they wear, their routine, what they do online and their holidays. We cover a range of grammatical structures and tenses.

Year 9 pupils learn about town, directions and the environment. We start get ready for the GCSE and focus on a range of tenses. Get ready for the adventure!









Modern Foreign Languages

Trips

Trips are a great way to engage the pupils and make the learning of a Language purposeful and real. We offer a variety of opportunities from Year 8 to Year 11.

Year 8 go to Normandy. Pupils get the opportunity to visit Bayeux Tapestry, go to a fun fair and go to a French market where they can practice their French.

Year 9-Year 10 get the opportunity to take part on the French exchange in Mer. A French exchange is a very different type of trip but possibly the most rewarding one. Pupils get to stay with a French family and their penfriend. They are totally immersed in the Language and make great progress from the experience. Last year we visited Le chateau de Chambord, Blois, we had a day at school and went to the Futuroscope.

Year 11 go to Paris in October half-term. We are running a Paris trip in October half-term 2026. Pupils will climb the Eiffel Tower, take a river cruise on the Seine and visit galleries.











Outdoor Education

With such stunning outdoor locations a short drive from the College, it's not surprising that we have a thriving and varied outdoor education programme!

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the world's leading youth achievement award, giving young people the opportunity to be the very best they can be.

DofE at the College has been developed to provide valuable teamwork experience, both through voluntary work and within school. Pupils build their self-confidence by setting goals and working towards them and will also get to push their boundaries - go exploring, discover new things about the world around them, and hopefully, discover something new about themselves.

In addition to encouraging young people to improve physical fitness, develop new skills and giving time to worthy causes, the College runs several DofE expeditions every year, utilising the fact that we have Dartmoor and the South West Coast Path on our doorstep.

We have around 100 pupils participating in the scheme at any time and the completion rate is very high. We have a fantastic team of qualified and experienced staff and volunteers to help pupils meet their goals and expand their horizons.

The Ten Tors Challenge

The Ten Tors Challenge is not for the faint-hearted! It involves months of arduous training in some of the worst conditions possible on Dartmoor, including fog, hail, rain, snow or high winds, over increasingly challenging distances with increasingly heavy backpacks.

We pride ourselves on the strengths of the Ten Tors teams we produce at the College, with teamwork, determination, and positive attitudes complementing the navigation and survival skills developed over the course of the training.

Our team of staff and volunteers are highly committed to Outdoor Education at the College, and give their time incredibly generously, knowing that participation in these activities gives pupils a lifetime love of adventure and the great outdoors, as well as a range of skills and qualities that will serve them well in the future.











Physical Education

Physical Education has a unique contribution to make to the total education of the individual, a learning process that will start early in the life of the child and which will hopefully continue to provide a healthy and active lifestyle in adulthood.

It is very much about providing for individuals a variety of enjoyable, demanding and rewarding challenges through which physical skills, knowledge and understanding can be developed.

We at Chulmleigh College are going to strive to instill these qualities into our lessons to ensure that every pupil gets to experience how Physical Education is not just a subject but a way of life.

We recognise that this subject is much bigger than a statistic; it is a subject that can breathe life into a school's curriculum and it's surrounding community.





Our Focus

Leadership

Build on pupils' leadership skills to allow them more opportunities within the department; not only extra-curricular but in curriculum time. Using sports prefects and leaders within our lessons.

Challenge

For every pupil to have something that may interest them. Encourage our top performers to represent the school. Every pupil to succeed to their full potential and challenge them in and out of lessons.

Experience

Create opportunities for pupils to watch live sport on a bigger occasion. Present opportunities to learn about what this subject can lead on to after Chulmleigh College.

House Competitions

We run competitions throughout the year which involves pupils representing their house. The first competition of the year is the Cross Country which every pupil takes part in a run around the town and the school grounds. It finishes the year with our Chulmleigh Games in the summer term with lots of Athletics events as well as tag rugby, kickball rounders and the tug of war.

Curriculum

We believe that gender is not a barrier in sport and every pupil follows the same curriculum in KS3. This means everyone will take part in subjects such as dance, netball, badminton, rugby and many more. As pupils get older, we specify the curriculum based on their interests rather than their ability.



Science

Science and Animal Care

At Chulmleigh College, we believe Science is essential for understanding the world around us. Our curriculum is designed to spark curiosity, deepen knowledge, and empower every pupil to shape their future through scientific thinking and exploration. We believe that Science is pivotal in being able to understand the world around us.

Facilities and Support

Our Science department boasts six newly built laboratories, fully equipped for practical learning. Dedicated prep rooms and two experienced Science Technicians support both classroom experiments and practicals conducted on-site and at our school farm.

We also have a variety of barns for different purposes which we use at the farm for handling animals, teaching area, storage and accommodation for our animals when the need arises.

Key Stage 3 Science

Science at Key Stage 3 begins in Year 7 with a focus on developing key scientific skills to apply across Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. Each term builds on key topics to ensure a strong foundation in all three disciplines from cells, atoms up to larger concepts with space.

In Year 9, pupils take part in taster sessions to explore their GCSE options. These include the Separate Sciences pathway and the BTEC in Animal Care. The GCSE Science curriculum officially begins in the spring term of Year 9, with the first topic in each science subject learnt.







Science

Key Stage 4 Science

Combined trilogy pathway:

Most pupils follow the Combined Science GCSE, resulting in two GCSE qualifications. Lessons blend theory and practical work, applying scientific concepts to real-world contexts. Highlights include:

- · Biology: dissections and outdoor sampling
- Chemistry: reactivity series, energy changes, and organic chemistry experiments
- Physics: investigations into electricity, energy, and forces

Separate Sciences Pathway

Pupils may opt for Separate Sciences, earning three GCSEs—one in each discipline. We follow the AQA specification, which includes all content from the Combined pathway plus additional topics explored in greater depth for example Space in Physics. Pupils receive five extra lessons and are taught by subject specialists in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics.

Animal Care:

Chulmleigh College is very proud to offer Animal Care as a GCSE option, supported by our on-site farm and copse. The farm is home to sheep and chickens, while our animal care facilities include a bearded dragon, guinea pigs, stick insects, and two dogs who are regular visitors.

Pupils gain hands-on experience in:

- Animal handling and welfare (including opportunities to care for some of our animals during the holidays)
- Preparing and maintaining enclosures
- Understanding legislation, diseases, and treatments

Lessons combine practical work with theoretical study, giving pupils a comprehensive introduction to animal care and the wider land-based sector.









Attendance

Learning Support Department

Learning For Pupils With Additional Needs

The Learning Support Department works closely with pupils and their parents to support any children who may need additional support to help them access their learning and to flourish at Chulmleigh.

We pride ourselves on ensuring that every pupil at Chulmleigh has access to the full range of the national curriculum. Meeting the needs of every pupil starts with the classroom teachers, who know their pupils well and will adapt tasks where necessary to ensure that everyone can take part and make progress. We have a fantastic team of Teaching Assistants, who work in a variety of ways across the school: sometimes supporting in lessons and sometimes taking a pupil out of part of a class to focus on developing numeracy and literacy skills, for example.

Our Learning Support Base is a very popular space in the school, and many pupils come up there at break and lunchtimes, to do homework on the computers, to chat or play games, and of course to spend time with Juno, the school dog. Juno is an important member of the Learning Support team and can provide emotional support should anyone need it.

As with every part of the school, high standards are central to the ethos of the Learning Support team. We find ways of adjusting the school experience for our pupils, so that each and every one of them can achieve "nothing but their best".

Pastoral Care

At Chulmleigh we see strong pastoral care as being integral to academic achievement and pupil wellbeing, and our strong pastoral systems are designed to consistently support pupils in developing the skills and character that they need to succeed. In addition to signposting to all pupils where they can receive support when needed, we also have specialist pastoral interventions for pupils who would benefit from more targeted support, such as our school nurse or our mentor team.

School Nursing

Charlotte Elphick is our school nurse. She visits the school every two weeks on a Wednesday. Charlotte is able to support pupils with healthy habits, diet, sleep routines and low level mental health support. Charlotte will see pupils who have been referred to the School Nursing Hub in 1:1 sessions.

Pupils can text a School Nurse to access support. Any young person aged 11-19 can use this texting service and do not need to be formally referred. They can use the support as and when they need.

Mentoring

A team of friendly mentors are in school every week to meet with pupils. Pupils work with their mentors 1:1 in either weekly or fortnightly appointments. This gives pupils a space where they can receive support to plan their futures, navigate friendships, talk through problems and debrief the week. Mentoring can help pupils to develop key skills for the future, including organisation, emotional regulation and improved confidence. We are lucky to have our mentoring team – one of the only schools in Devon to lead such a project, we were featured on the BBC and radio last year!



Assemblies offer a moment to celebrate achievements, acknowledge hard work, and look ahead with purpose.


