

### Key Stage Four




 Pupils begin their formal study of their GCSEs in Years 10 and 11 (Key Stage 4).

There are two types of courses - core and optional.

Core are subjects that all pupils must study.

 Optional are subjects that pupils may choose themselves.


### What are blocks??



- The College timetable is built from blocks of subjects.
- The blocks contain classes of the same subject or are mixed.
- The whole year group have one allocated class per block and this is why some subjects can clash. For example, Sociology and Psychology could be in the same block and therefore pupils may only choose one of these subjects.
- Option Blocks are optimised to give the widest choice to the maximum number of pupils.

- Gives our pupils a competitive advantage. EBacc outcomes at Chulmleigh are the best for a nonselective, non-fee paying school in the South West


### **Personal Tutor**



Pupils organised into horizontal tutor groups in Year 10, retaining the same form tutor where possible. Focus on:

- Intervention.
- PSHE
- Careers Education
- Study Skills

### The Expectations of KS4



- Pupils take a greater responsibility for their work.
- Pupils utilise study-support.
- Homework (c. one hour per subject) completed on time.
- Accelerated Reader
- Attendance.
- Role Models.

- Maintain an ongoing conversation about school.


## Frequently asked questions



■ A subject I want is not running, why not? Lack of a subject specialist or lack of uptake means that some courses don't run. A class needs at least 15 pupils to be viable.

What happens if a subject is full? We will make a decision on places based on effort grades in that subject (or equivalent) in Year 9 and consider effort in Year 9 Exam Week.

### Frequently asked questions



■ Can I change my mind after I submit my form? Yes, but courses may be full already if you do so after the deadline.

Why do I need to submit an insurance choice? Sometimes we move the subjects from one block to another to optimise choice or a course is full or is withdrawn.
