Year 11 GCSE Preparation



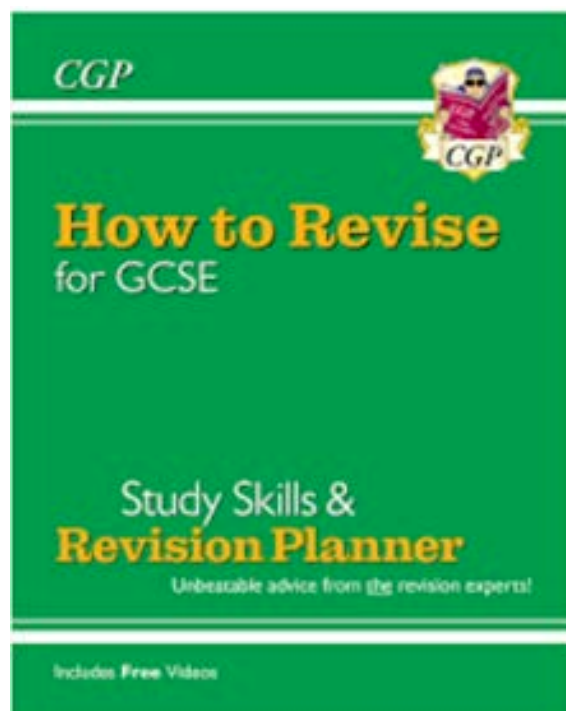
Today, all of Year 11 had their second group revision session in Heywood Hall. We started by looking at how they can use the book they have been given, 'How to revise'. They have been tasked with using this book to make a revision timetable over the weekend to help them manage their time effectively, so they feel well prepared and confident for their upcoming GCSE exams. It would be great if parents and carers of Year 11 pupils could support the use of the 'How to revise' book at home, it has a whole host of revision techniques inside, along with space for a revision timetable and checklists.

Next, we focused on two revision techniques. The first was 'mind palace' which helps pupils remember sequences or timelines. This involves taking a familiar walk in your mind, for example, around your home. As you pass by certain points on your journey you imagine seeing words / dates at each location. Today's example was the pathway that blood takes through the heart. So, as you open the front door to your home, you imagine the words 'vena cava' written on the door, as you move into the hallway you see 'right atrium' written on the wall and so on.

The other technique that was modelled to pupils was about the use of GCSE past papers, the 'gold standard' when it comes to revision. Pupils were shown how to use process of elimination on multiple choice questions and how to annotate information in the question to help them structure their answers.

Well done to all the Year 11 pupils for engaging with today's session and committing to their revision.

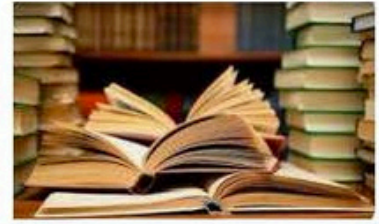

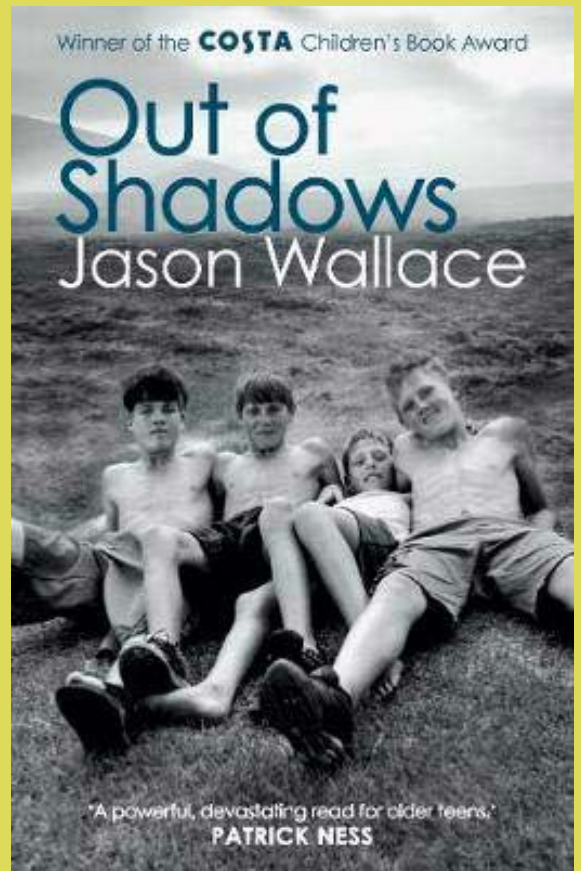
Book of the Week: Out of Shadows by Jason Wallace

Back in the early 1980s, Robert Jacklin doesn't want to move to the newly independent Zimbabwe with his parents, nor does he want to be shipped off to boarding school, but he has no choice in either decision.

In the aftermath of a brutal war, raw and disturbing memories drive the lives of most of those around him, both black and white, and Robert finds himself confused and lonely as his home life quietly disintegrates.

As the violence and corruption in his adopted country become impossible to ignore, he is forced into a decision which has consequences he could never have foreseen.

An expert and disturbing examination of the meaning of morality and of the comprehensive and complex legacy of conflict and injustice.

Transport for post 16 students

what you need to know



Information correct February 2024



Am I eligible for assistance from DCC?

Devon County Council does not provide a universal post-16 assisted travel scheme. It expects that students, parents or carers will consider how students are going to get to and from their Post 16 school/college prior to applying and accepting a place.

My parents/carers are not able to get me to and from my school/college

You and your parents or carers need to explore all avenues available to get you to and from the school or college. This could be walking to college, cycling, car share, public transport, Vacant Seat scheme, private taxi etc.

Public Transport

Where there is public transport serving a school/college, it is expected that you, your parent or your carer should make travel arrangements directly with the bus or rail company.

There is no suitable public transport to my school or college

The expectation is that you, your parents or carers will make the necessary arrangements for you to get to and from school or college. If there is a contract vehicle already running to the school/college you may apply for a Vacant Seat. You need to make an application at an early stage, before 1 July, via the webpage below, using the online application link:

devon.cc/vacant-seats

What is a Vacant Seat?

A Vacant Seat is where there is no public transport available but there is a contract vehicle operating to your school or college with a spare seat. If you are offered a Vacant Seat following your application it will be guaranteed for that academic year. **A contribution to the cost of transport is required.**

My family are on a low income and cannot afford the cost of transport

If your family are on a low income the school/college should be approached for help. Most establishments receive 16-19 bursary funds to provide targeted help to individuals in need. They may choose to make financial awards to young people in ways that best fit their needs and circumstances.

Bursary awards should be targeted towards young people facing financial barriers to education, such as the costs of transport, meals, books and equipment. You will need to contact the establishment direct to discuss possible bursary funding.

There is public transport/contract vehicle but I am not able to travel on it because of my needs

If you are not able to travel by public transport or on a contract vehicle because of your additional needs Devon County Council may be able to provide support for Independent Travel Training.

Please contact a member of the Transport Co-ordination Service to discuss this further on **0345 155 1019**.

If Devon offer me assistance what form will this take?

This will vary on a case by case basis and will be dependent on your family's circumstances. If support is agreed by Devon County Council the Transport Co-ordination Service will decide what the minimum level of support is required. This may be:

- Independent Travel Training.
- A Vacant Seat on a contract vehicle.
- A petrol allowance to assist your parents/carers to take you to school or college in the family vehicle.
- A financial contribution to assist your parents/carers with the cost of making private transport arrangements to enable you to get to school or college.

Will any help offered be free of charge?

No. Any help offered by Devon County Council will be subject to the payment of the parental contribution.

Will any help offered be for the duration of my post 16 studies?

No. Any help offered by Devon County Council will be for that academic year only, or the duration agreed by the local authority if for a shorter time. You will need to re-apply each academic year.

I have no way of getting to my school or college

Where you cannot make your own arrangements to get to a school or college and there is no public transport or Vacant Seat available then you can talk to the Transport Co-ordination Service about what other support may be available. In some cases this will mean that an Assessment of Need will be carried out.

During the Assessment of Need process, the Transport Co-ordination Service will ask a series of questions to find out why you, your parents or carers are not able to make the necessary travel arrangements. They will identify the minimal help required to remove transport as a barrier to you continuing in education.

You, your parents or carers will need to provide additional evidence to support the Assessment of Need. The normal parental contribution for the academic year will be applied to any support provided by Devon County Council.

I am over 19 but continuing in education will I be able to ask for help?

If you are aged 19 or over on the 1st September and your Education, Health and Care Plan supports you continuing on in education, you will need to re-apply for transport through a Post 19 Assessment of Needs. If you are not entitled to Post 19 education funded transport, you can apply for support through Adult Care by contacting **MyDevon** on **0345 155 1007**.
