Henry VIII

As Henry got older he became overweight and unhealthy and tyrannical and put thousands of people to death.

Born at Greenwich on 28th June 1491, he was the 2nd son of Henry VII and Elizabeth.

Henry died at Whitehall on the 28th January 1547, age 55.

Henry was well educated but had no enthusiasm for statecraft or personal rule.

He spoke several languages, played musical instruments and was good at dancing, hunting and sport.

Henry was crowned at Westminster Abbey on 24th June 1509.

In order to strengthen his hand in European diplomacy he started a ship building programme to power the navy.

Cardinal Wolsey hoped Henry VII and Francis I would sign a treaty, but nothing was done and they went to war again.

Key facts about King Henry VIII

King Henry VIII was born on the 28th June 1491 in a place called Greenwich Palace when he was little (infant) he was not heir to the throne. He had a brother called Arthur who was older than him. Who died at 15 years. Arthur died of an illness which left Henry as the oldest male child. Henry became king on the 22nd April 1509 after his father Henry VII died. Henry had 6 wives during his reign and 4 children that lived past infancy.

Henry was the 3rd child of Henry VII and Elizabeth of York. He was baptised in 1493 by Richard Foxe bishop of Exeter.

Henry was an extremely religious person. The Pope gave him the title 'Defender of Faith'. Henry only became king at the age of 17 years!

Henry wanted to divorce Catherine of Aragon. The Pope would not allow this. As a result Henry made himself the head of the Church of England.

Though you likely know Henry as fat, he was very sporty in his youth. He enjoyed a range of sports, which included jousting, archery, tennis and throwing the hammer (there is evidence of him using a blacksmith's hammer). In 1510 when Henry was 19, a chronicler wrote that the young king 'shotte as strong and as greate a length as any of his garde'.

Despite loving sport, Henry VIII banned football. This was because football had no formal rules and it was really common for it to turn into a massive brawl. Whole villages battled to get a leather ball or pigs bladder to a set location, like a pub doorway. Injuries and property damage were common and even deaths were recorded. Henry banned football, and instead promoted archery. He made it mandatory for men to practice archery and gave money for resources. Henry was preparing his men for war.

Henry wrote the most songs out of any English monarch. These are recorded in a manuscript. He did not get an education in the kingship, but for a Catholic profession. He enjoyed many kinds of songs and he played a range of instruments including the cornet, lute and organ. He even had an impressive collection of musical instruments and 58 full time musicians working for him.



In 1531, Richard Roose was accused of poisoning a meal where a woman died and several people fell ill, including one of Henry's friends. Henry was highly afraid of falling ill and of being poisoned. Henry made a new law saying poisoning was a treasonous act and the punishment was being boiled alive. Richard Roose was boiled to death.

Henry was a hypochondriac—he was very worried about his health and was afraid of getting ill. His brother died of an illness and experts believe Henry did genuinely have several medical conditions. He had an entire cabinet of medicinal potions made by his doctors.

Henry VIII had poor eyesight, that deteriorated with age. Records show he bought 10 pairs of glasses at a time from Germany.

The image above shows he wore glasses that were attached to a helmet, so his poor eyesight could not stop him in battle.

He also had a lot of magnifying glasses.

His eye sight got so bad that he couldn't sign court documents as he could not read them. He was smart enough not to sign something he couldn't read first.

Some experts speculate that Henry had type II diabetes or another disorder, that affected his vision.

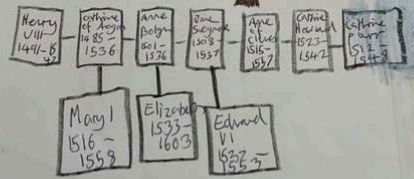

Henry VIII was a monarch from the 16th century. He was the second son of Henry VII and not the original heir. His older brother, Prince Arthur, was the inherit to the throne, before his death.

Henry VIII became king in 1509, his rule ending in 1547 as of his death. He died by a long period of time with poor health. Many of his poor health factors are; a jousting accident, obesity and wound deterioration.

He had six different wives; Catherine of Aragon (divorced), Anne Boleyn (beheaded), Jane Seymour (died), Anne of Cleves (divorced), Catherine Howard (beheaded) and Catherine Parr (survived). He solely wanted a son, marrying many wives for that reason. Overall, he only had one son, Edward VI.

He was, at the beginning of his life, a devout Catholic. Later on in his life, he became a Protestant. Many believe he did this for power and money, but some do believe that it could be because of love or religion.

Devon Athletic Championship

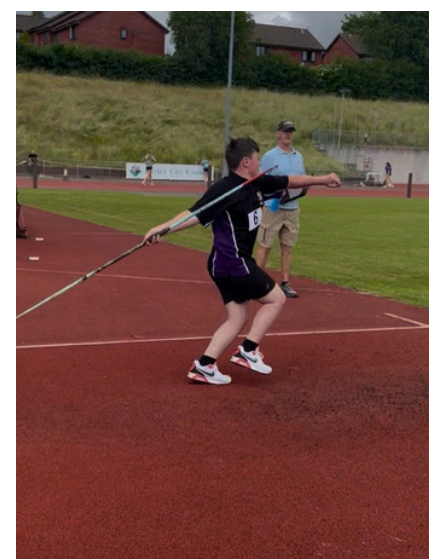

Dr Christina Hunt, Conservation Scientist

Former Chulmleigh College pupil, Dr Christina Hunt, has kindly taken the time to send us an update about the academic journey and career path since she left Chulmleigh College. We hope her success helps to inspire all those budding scientists and conservationists amongst you!

I am currently working as a Conservation Scientist for the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds) up in the highlands of Scotland. I'm working on two different projects, one is studying habitat use of the rare Slavonian grebe and the other project is studying the impacts of a large-scale habitat restoration project called Cairngorms Connect. My job is really varied, including planning research projects, doing fieldwork, and writing up my results as reports and scientific publications. Aside from doing my research I've also given talks to visiting groups, run events for school pupils and even been filmed for a TV show (BBC Landward).

My career path has been really varied but always following a biological theme. After leaving Chulmleigh in 2012 I went to Exeter College for my A levels, studying biology, chemistry, maths and further maths. This set me up for a BA Biological Sciences degree at the University of Oxford. During my degree I went to Honduras to study invasive lionfish for my dissertation project and I enjoyed it so much that I ended up staying at Oxford to do a PhD on lionfish ecology and behaviour. After my PhD I worked for the RSPB for two years, mainly doing fieldwork for Cairngorms Connect, which involved wild camping up in the mountains whilst surveying moths, birds and plants. I then moved to Portsmouth University to work as a Senior Research Associate, using a sea angling competition to study sharks and rays in the Solent. After that contract I moved back to the Cairngorms for my current job.

It might sound like a big jump between my marine biology background and then studying moths and birds, but lots of the required skills are actually the same. These transferable skills include things like coordinating fieldwork, working in a team, data analysis, and communication skills. These are all skills that I initially developed through my PhD and fieldwork in Honduras but have continued to develop throughout my career, regardless of what species or habitat I am researching.

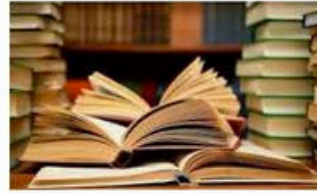

Two boys can't remember the last time they had a hug.

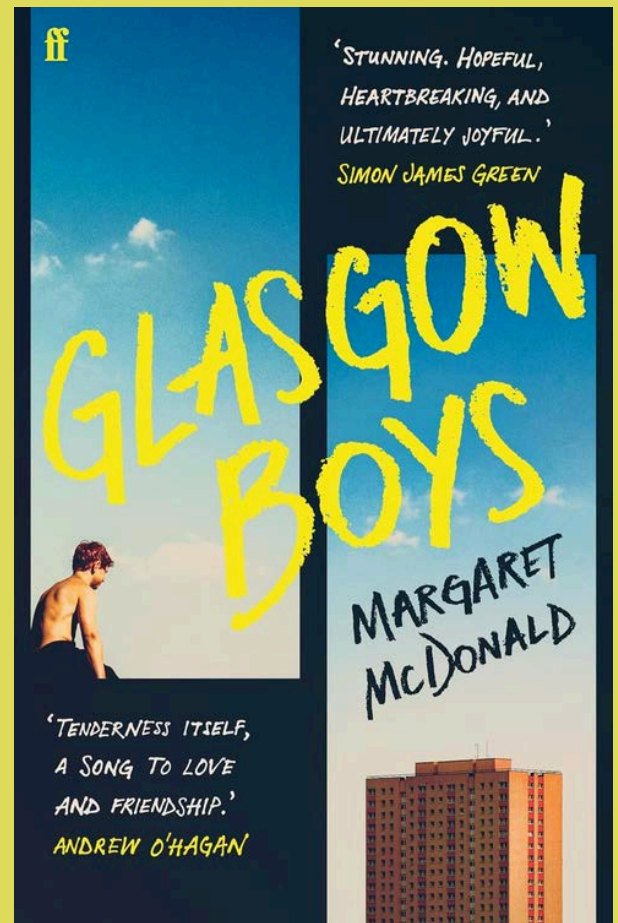
Meet Finlay. He's studying for his nursing degree at Glasgow University, against all the odds. But coming straight from care means he has no support network.

Pupils got to try out lessons in science, design and technology, food and nutrition and PE. They were also given a tour of the College and were assisted throughout the day by Year 9 pupils.

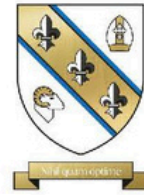
Thank you to everyone involved for making the days such a success - it was great to see how positive and engaged all these young pupils were, despite any initial nerves they may have had!
