Dear Parents and Carers,

As we come to the end of the final week of this half term, we reflect not only on the week but also on the last six weeks of school. It has been wonderfully busy, and it has been great to see pupils achieving so much. My thanks go to our staff, volunteers and, of course, our families for making sure our pupils do so well.

It has felt like a big week for Year 10 pupils, as they have been put through their paces in their first round of speaking mocks in GCSE French and have also received a presentation about the Senior Guild interviews next half term. I often say how important the study of an additional language is. At Chulmleigh, this is part of our DNA, and we are exceptionally proud of the fact that every single pupil is studying French in Year 10. A second language opens so many doors for young people – travel, work abroad, learning about different cultures – and enriches life. Qualifications are key for our pupils, but a life well spent is one fulfilled with an education that promotes curiosity and wisdom about the world around us. Language education is key here. I am mindful that pupils who study in selective or private schools often take a second language for granted, and I am proud that this is something we can also take for granted at Chulmleigh. My congratulations to all Year 10 pupils who completed a Speaking Assessment this week.

Ms Thorncroft led an assembly this week to launch the Senior Guild interviews with Year 10. Our Senior Guild interviews give pupils formal interview practice and feedback as part of the Professional Development curriculum. They also serve as the selection process for pupil leadership positions, as Year 10 prepare to take up the role of senior pupils from Year 11. We look forward to selecting our Head Girl and Head Boy, alongside the wider team, as we approach Easter, and we will keep you updated. There is a great deal of ambition in Year 10, and it is wonderful to see. I look forward to listening to their presentations and hearing their responses to our questions.

I spoke to Year 11 in assembly this week about the importance of revision during the half-term break. We do, of course, want to see pupils relaxing and spending time with their families and friends over half term – but February half term is a great opportunity to be well into revision. By starting revision early and working steadily on this in the run-up to the exams, successive Year 11 cohorts at Chulmleigh have achieved the very best GCSE results. Sometimes, we see a divide between those who revise well and do well and, frankly, those who do not on results day. I am confident that this Year 11 cohort will strike the right balance between relaxation and work this half term.

Finally, in a week where pupils are tired at the end of the half term, I thank parents for ensuring pupils have been present in school, looking smart, fully equipped and ready to work.

On behalf of all the staff here at the College, I wish everyone a great half-term break. We look forward to seeing pupils for the second half of the Spring Term on Monday 23rd February.

Daisie Nelson interviews Senior Prefect, Caitlin Pinhey

Daisie: Which hobbies have you picked up since being at Chulmleigh?

Caitlin: Since starting at Chulmleigh I have taken up more sports like netball, rugby and badminton. I also started playing football in primary and I still play today - I do really enjoy football!

Daisie: Do you take part in any clubs outside of school?

Caitlin: I do football outside of school and netball in school. The netball team is run by Mrs Markham and I do really enjoy it - I have been in the club since Year 7.

Daisie: What was your favourite subject in primary school, and what is it now?

Caitlin: I love music and I play the guitar. I have been playing it for a while. I also really like maths. This has been the case since primary school and all the way through Chulmleigh.

Daisie: As you are in Year 11, what GCSEs have you picked?

Caitlin: I have picked triple science and further maths. Music would have been an option too.

Daisie: Covid happened when you were in Years 5 and 6 – how would you say it affected you?

Caitlin: I lost quite a lot of my friends and there was little to no social interactions, so it was quite hard to go from being friends and talking in person together to going to no in person talking and just calling on phones. It was quite difficult as I attended Chulmleigh in Year 7 after Covid - sitting in a room with over 150 people and knowing very few of them seemed so strange to me.

Daisie: What have you done to prepare for your GCSE exams?

Caitlin: I have focused on not cramming all revision and homework at the last minute as that can easily leave me feeling overwhelmed. GCSEs come around a lot faster than you realise! I think I started revising around this time in Year 10 for



my mocks and I am very glad I did. I make sure I have plenty of breaks between revision as it helps a lot instead of just cramming it into one session.

Daisie: If you have any advice for the younger years, what would it be?

Caitlin: Don't stress and don't panic. Revision doesn't have to take all your time, little and often is better.

Daisie: Please tell me a bit more about you becoming senior prefect.

Caitlin: I found the selection process quite nerve racking as I had done very little public speaking before becoming senior prefect. I did the odd assembly but nothing massive. I'm glad I did it though as one of the things I am really happy to be involved with is the planning of the Year 11 Ball. It is a Chulmleigh College tradition which I have always been excited about and now it's our turn so it will be great to be a part of the whole process.

During my time at Chulmleigh, I was unsure of the career path I wanted to pursue until I attended an event in Exeter where I met Royal Air Force recruiters. From that moment, I knew that joining the RAF was the path I was meant to follow.

I was particularly inspired by my sister, also a former Chulmleigh College pupil, who became an instructor for Advanced Manufacture and Repair Technicians – the trade I am now entering. Listening to her speak about her role and experiences within the RAF confirmed that this was the career I wanted to pursue. Motivated by this goal, I worked hard to achieve my GCSEs and later enrolled at Bicton College to study Military and Protective Services.

During my time at college, one of my instructors was a former RAF Police Sergeant who provided valuable guidance and support throughout my application process. The application process took approximately six months, culminating in receiving my basic training start date of 25th August.

Leaving home to begin basic training was one of the most challenging experiences I have faced, but it has been incredibly rewarding. The initial weeks focused on adapting to military life, including living away from home and sharing accommodation with ten other recruits. Although it was a significant adjustment, I persevered and successfully completed the course.

Throughout training, I developed a wide range of skills, including CBRN (Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear) procedures, weapon handling, basic first aid, and fieldcraft – the latter being a particular highlight. We spent a week in the field simulating deployment conditions, learning essential operational skills. We also experienced adventure training in Wales, where we took part in team-building activities that strengthened resilience and leadership. In the final phase of training, we focused on rifle drill and preparation for our graduation parade.

Graduation day was one of the proudest moments of my life, and sharing that achievement with my family made it even more meaningful.

I am now in holding, preparing to begin Phase Two of my training and looking forward to continuing my development within the Royal Air Force.

March of the Human Robots - (and the Rise of Young Coders)

This week, our Y9 classroom briefly time-traveled back to the 1980s. No, not for the hairstyles (thankfully), but for inspiration from Big Trak –the iconic programmable toy that taught a generation that robots do exactly what you tell them... exactly.

Armed with that retro spirit, we set out on a bold mission: programming human robots.

At first, it seemed simple enough. Pupils were given a puzzle and a willing “robot” (a classmate brave enough to surrender free will). The task? Write clear, step-by-step “code” to guide the robot from start to finish. No guessing. No improvising. No “you know what I mean.” The robot would only follow the instructions as written—which led to some hilarious early results involving unexpected spins, dramatic pauses, and the occasional walk into absolutely nothing.

But that was just the beginning.

Very quickly, the challenges levelled up. Pupils paired up and tackled problems of increasing complexity, discovering that when puzzles get harder, teamwork gets smarter. They learned to decompose big problems into smaller, manageable steps—one instruction at a time. Suddenly, “go over there” became a precise sequence of movements, turns, and actions.

Then came the real programmer mindset: functions.

Instead of rewriting the same instructions again and again, pupils created named tasks—mini programs within the program—that could be reused. Efficient. Elegant. Very impressive. Somewhere, a software engineer (teacher) shed a proud tear.

To keep things extra spicy, there was a strict limitation: only two variables, x and y . These had to be assigned values right at the start, before the robot ever took its first step. Change the values, and the entire outcome could change. Pupils quickly saw how powerful (and dangerous) variables can be—and how important it is to plan ahead.

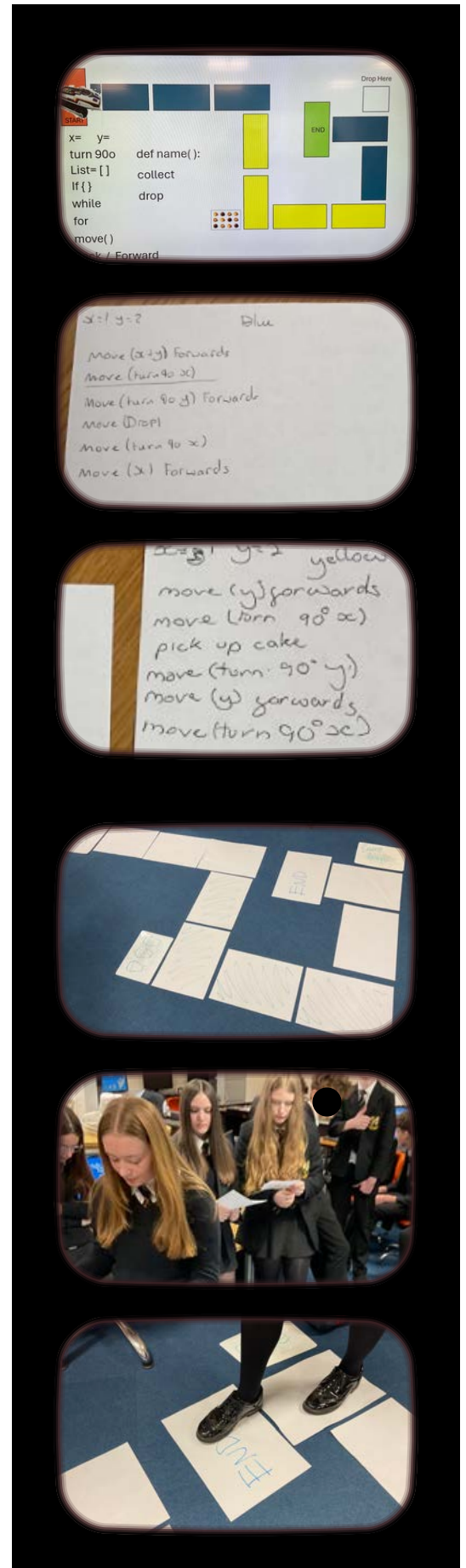
What stood out most wasn't just the learning, but the persistence. When the robot didn't do what they expected, pupils didn't give up. They debugged. They tested. They laughed. They tried again. Each mistake became data, not failure.

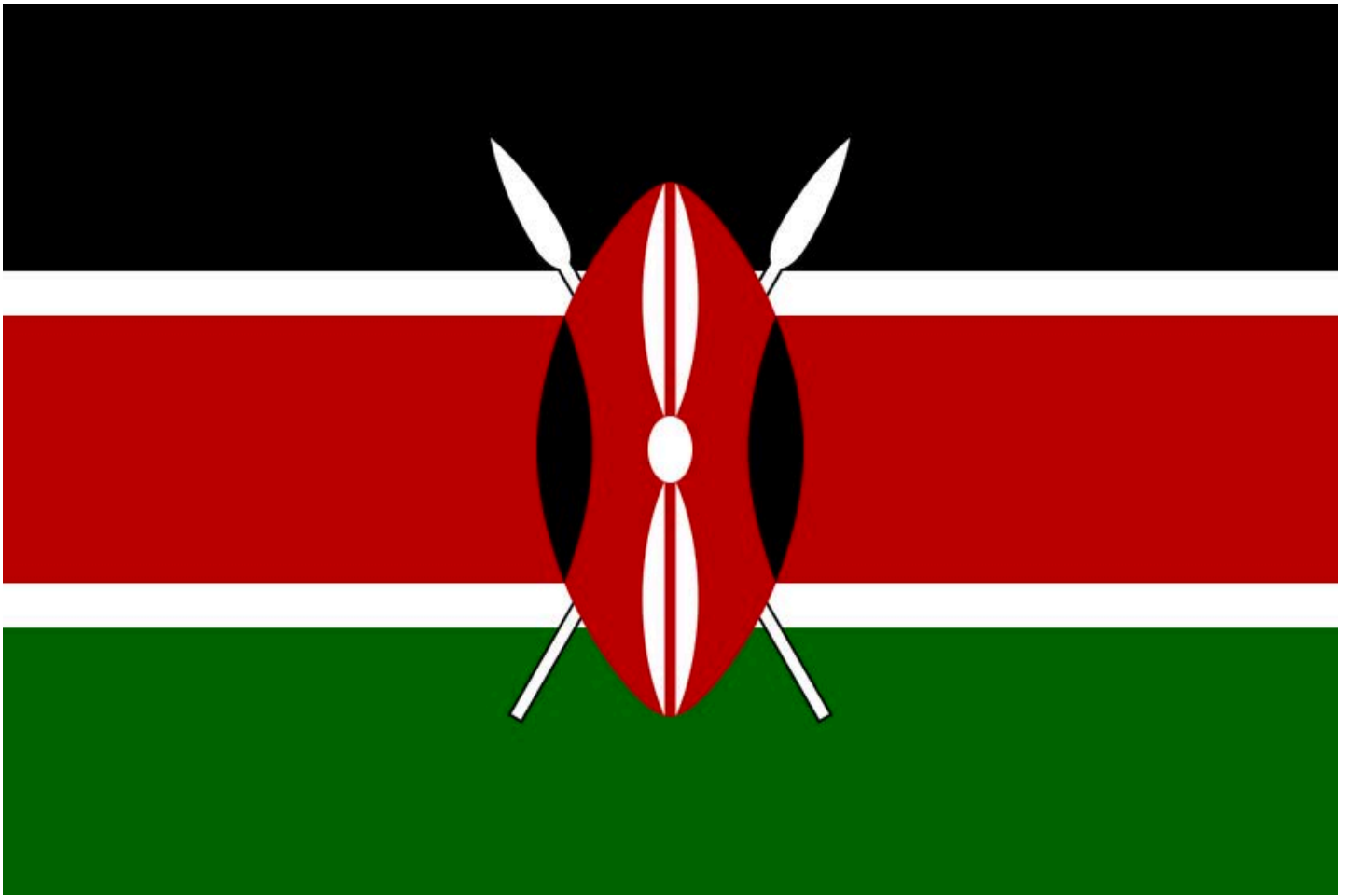
By the end, our classrooms were buzzing with logic, creativity, and confidence. Pupils weren't just solving puzzles—they were thinking like problem-solvers, collaborators, and coders.

And the best part? They discovered that even with just two variables, a few functions, and a lot of thinking, they could control a robot, crack a challenge, and maybe—just maybe—change the future.

Not bad for a bunch of humans programming humans.

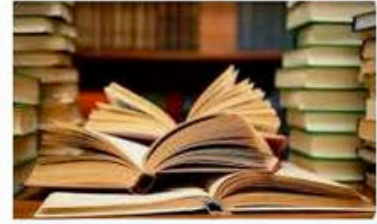

Daisie Nelson interviews Mrs Brock

Daisie: How long have you worked at Chulmleigh College as a librarian?

Mrs Brock: I have been a librarian here for 19 years.

Daisie: What is the best bit about your job?

Mrs Brock: To be able to share my love of reading, to help pupils find 'the book' which inspires their reading journey. To share reviews of books, it never ceases to amaze me how 2 people can read the same book and have totally polar opinions - it's brilliant! I also enjoy the shopping aspect, choosing which books I think the pupils will enjoy.

Daisie: What makes a good librarian?

Mrs Brock: Someone who knows their stock and can match it to the right pupil. For example when a pupil says 'can I have the book with a green tree on it' and you know exactly what they are talking about - it takes skill and experience!

Daisie: What could pupils do to help the library run smoothly?

Mrs Brock: Remember their library cards! It is so much quicker to scan the card rather than type up a name in the system. Also, return their books on time!

Daisie: Can we request books if you don't have them in our library?

Mrs Brock: Yes, absolutely. if we don't have a copy here there is a good chance that one of the other 50+ libraries in Devon will have one.

Daisie: If you were stranded on a desert island which three books, would you choose to have with you?

Mrs Brock: That's hard to choose as I love so many books. I think an obvious choice would be some kind of desert island survival guide! I recently read 'murder mindfully' I could happily read that again. For my last book I think 'powerless' trilogy as I haven't gotten around to reading that yet.

Daisie: How many books do Chulmleigh College pupils read on average in an academic year?

Mrs Brock: I don't fully know as the figures are combined with the primary school but approximately around 19,000.

Daisie: Our library is also open to the public - why is this important?



Daisie: Our library is also open to the public - why is this important?

Mrs Brock: It is great to be able to offer great books and services to our community. It is important that books are available to the young to start their reading journey and the library provides a meeting place for older members of our community to meet and connect.

Daisie: Recently we were visited by Councillors Cottle-Hunkins and Bell to talk about Ivor Marsh Library. We learnt that Devon County Council are requesting people to participate in a consultation about the library service in Devon. Please may you explain what this consultation is about and why it is important?

Mrs Brock: Devon county Council basically don't have enough funding to continue to fund libraries the way they currently do. The consultation is a discussion to help find solutions which will keep out libraries operating as community hubs.

Daisie: Can pupils participate in the consultation?

Mrs Brock: Yes, there is a questionnaire for young people to fill out as the council are keen to hear the views of young people. [Have Your Say Today - Survey for young people - Shaping Devon's Library Service](#)

Daisie: Why is it important that pupils take part in the consultation?

Mrs Brock: It is important that those who will be making decisions about our libraries know that young people use them. The libraries isn't just for books - it is also a safe space for other activities and clubs.

Daisie: If you could get every pupil to do just one thing, what would it be?

Mrs Brock: Just to be kind and respect everyone.



School Lunches - Information for Pupils and Parents

- Should a pupil not have enough funds on their account, they should visit the Pupil Support Office before going to the canteen, where they should obtain a meal slip.
- Pupils are able to check their account balances using the machines located at the entrances to the canteen.
- All free school meal (FSM) pupils have accounts topped up daily with £2.61. This credit does not show when you check your balance on the fingerprint machines but will show up on the tills. If you have debt, this is on your personal account and not your FSM account and will need to be paid off by parents at some point. It does mean that all FSM pupils have £2.61 to spend every day whether their personal account is in debt or not.
- If pupils are not set up with fingerprint access, or if it is not working, please go to reception.
- We would also like to remind parents and carers that pupils eligible for free school meals may eat at both breaktime and lunchtime within their allowance. A breakfast option is available at breaktime (two slices of toast with a topping or a bowl of cereal) for 41p, leaving sufficient balance for a main meal, pasta dish, sandwich, or similar option at lunchtime.
- Parents may check which meals their children are purchasing by going to the MyEd app. Select accounts (bottom right of screen), select the month and then select the day of purchase that you want to check.
- The full menu and price list is available on the College website and in Optime.
- We kindly ask that you ensure your child's account is topped up regularly to avoid any inconvenience.
